

SPEAKERS LAST WEEK



Prior to last week's meeting some members could have been asking themselves what relevance do bees have with Rotary Service! The answer came

with speed and clarity when John McCaskill and Faye Kirkwood addressed their audience.

John McCaskill has given a lifetime community service including 25 years with the Rotary Club of Canterbury. He is the current chair of Rotarians for Bees (RFB). John attributes much of his friendship in ecological observations to the enlightening documentaries of David Attenborough. Three years ago an Attenborough programme dealing with the decline of bees in the U.S. and Europe and its universal significance got John on the march. In no time he met with John Sipek, former mayor of Moonee Valley, a council in the forefront of bee protection and bee proliferation. Hence was formed RFB.



Bees are particularly good **pollinators** because they need pollen to feed their young in their nests. Each time that they fly off to another flower, they leave some pollen on the female part of the flower. This pollinates the flower and helps the plant to produce seeds.

The dangers to bee life are numerous.

- The varroa insect mite which is devastating bee populations around the world and virtually now on the Aussie doorstep.
- Pesticides and their incorrect use
- Reduced habitat destruction of old buildings, reduction of trees and domestic gardens.



The two key objectives of RFB are education (school gardens, education classes etc.) and habitat renewal in urban development.

John dropped a few mouth scorching facts: Bees pollinate 80% of the world's plants including 90 different food crops and 1

out of every 3 or 4 bites of food you eat is thanks to bees and pollination.

Caufield Rotarian since 2011, trained nurse working with persons with a disability, business management professional and president of Diabetes Support Association, Faye Kirkwood would be an asset in any field of service. Faye has been very involved with ESRAG and together with RFB she has worked with numerous Rotary Districts, local councils, state and federal government bodies.

Faye's anthem is "Food security means bee security". Faye distributed a sheet depicting the bee dependence of food crops — tree, broad acre, ground, vine and seed



production. As an example of those which have 100% dependence on bee pollination it includes apple, avocado, orange, canola and cotton seed, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, bean and carrot.

Beekeepers must be registered with the Dept. of Agriculture. Faye described in intimate detail both the private and the public life of bees — the entire biological life of the natural world. RFB aims to train private beekeepers. It aims to assist beekeepers in moving to areas where pollination can take place. Exchange with other countries is essential — teaching and learning. Activating children in the field is also essential — children teach their parents! Faye's final message was twofold — don't use pesticides on bees and buy <u>local</u> honey.



Concluding the talks Chair Max Walsh presented RBA with a Preston \$250 cheque.
